For Ages 15- up: Novels and Stories

When discerning which novels to read, Catholics should take the advice of Mother Mary Loyola:

“Remember that, like other forms of recreation, [books] must not become the occupation of life, but be used as a means to an end. It is a wise counsel to read no novels in the morning. Keep your mind for serious reading whilst it is fresh. Have a fixed time in the afternoon that you will give to lighter reading, and show your self-control by closing your book at an exciting part when the right moment comes.

Don’t let yourself be the slave of any book. Watch its influence upon your mind. If, when you put it down, you turn to your daily life again with a disgust for its commonplace scenes and humdrum duties, with feelings of pity for yourself and of irritation with others, be quite sure that book is doing you harm. Instead of invigorating your mind by a wholesome change of scenery, and sending you back to work refreshed and braced, it is making you discontented, feeble, selfish. “Great Books” to Read

In the past, the following books would be read with an instructor and were studied mainly by boys and men in the universities. We do not recommend every person to read classical works, only if it is necessary for one’s education and if one has proper guidance. Catholics should first have a deep understanding of their faith before reading the “Great Books”, and should be acquainted with St. Thomas Aquinas before reading any of the Greek or Roman classical works.

- *Ethics* by Aristotle
- *Republic* by Plato
- *The Odyssey* and *The Illiad* by Homer
 - However, these should be read with caution as some scenes are indecent.
- *The Aeneid* by Virgil
- *Oedipus the King* by Sophocles
 - As with Homer’s works, a young adult should not read this alone. With a guided reading, it is a good example of a Greek tragedy that formed the mindset of the Greeks.
- *The Divine Comedy* by Dante Alighieri
- *Confessions* by St. Augustine
- *City of God* by St. Augustine
- *The Canterbury Tales* by Geoffrey Chaucer
 - Some of these tales present indecent or immoral scenarios, so a careful perusal of the stories is necessary to discern which stories are acceptable to read. The impure tales such as “The Miller’s Tale” and “The Shipman’s Tale”, as well as the vulgar tales such as “The Summoner’s Tale” should be avoided.
 - Tales that we can recommend are “The Pardoner’s Tale”, “The Clerk’s Tale”, “The Prioress’ Tale”, “The Second Nun’s Tale”, “The Nun’s Priest’s Tale”, “The Parson’s Tale”.
- *The Tempest* by William Shakespeare
 - For all of the Shakespeare plays, we advise against watching live performances of them, because the actors tend to overemphasize the raunchy jokes and insinuos. When reading the play, one can often overpass the vulgar parts without realizing what was said. The plays we recommend are the least vulgar of them all.

“Great Books” to Avoid

We advise Catholics to seriously consider this decree from the Index of Forbidden Books of 1963 before attempting to read books dangerous to faith and morals:

“VII: Books which professedly deal with, narrate, or teach things lascivious or obscene are absolutely prohibited, since not only the matter of faith but also that of morals, which are usually easily corrupted through the reading of such books, must be taken into consideration, and those who possess them are to be severely punished by the bishops. *Ancient books written by heathens may by reason of their elegance and quality of style be permitted but may by no means be read to children.*

VIII: Books whose chief contents are good but in which some things have incidentally been inserted which have reference to heresy, ungodliness, divination, or superstition, may be permitted if by the authority of the general inquisition they have been purged by Catholic theologians. . . All the faithful are commanded not to presume to read or possess any books contrary to the prescriptions of these rules or the prohibition of this list. . .”

 - Although this book - and others of Jane Austen’s - can be read to better understand and critically analyze her times, she promotes romanticism in addition to semi-feminist ideas. Ladies should especially be cautious if they read Austen’s works, because they can easily fall into the trap of sentimentalism.

 - This book can be read to analyze the Northern soldiers of the Civil War; however, it is very dark, vulgar, and depressing. It does not present the noble ideal of a soldier that should be instilled in young men, even if it is a realistic portrayal of many of the Civil War soldier’s attitudes towards the war.
